CEAC Elects New Officers for 2011/2012 **Alameda County Director of Public Works to Lead Statewide** **County Engineering Organization**

SACRAMENTO – The County Engineers Association of California (CEAC) recently elected its officers for 2011/2012 at the Association's 117th Annual Meeting, held in San Francisco City/County.

Alameda County Public Works Director, Daniel Woldesenbet will serve as President of the organization for the coming year. Also elected were Humboldt County Public Works Director Tom Mattson as President-Elect and Santa Barbara County Public Works Director Scott McGolpin as Secretary. Julie Bueren, Public Works Director from Contra Costa County, will serve as the Past President.

Daniel Woldesenbet has served as a CEAC officer for the past two years, including holding the post of President-Elect and Secretary. He has played an active role in CEAC, representing urban counties and the oversight committee for several years and as a member of the Executive Committee for the last two years.

Tom Mattson currently represents the rural county areas on the City County State Federal Co-Op committee and the Safetea-Lu: State Strategic Highway Implementation Plan (SHSIP). He also represents CEAC on the Safe Routes to Schools Advisory Committee. Tom has been actively involved in the association since 1998, and has served as a CEAC Northern California Regional Director, Chairman of the CEAC Transportation Committee, and CEAC Officer for the past year.

Scott McGolpin has been actively involved in CEAC since 1999 and a member of the CEAC Board of Directors for five years. He has shown a great commitment to CEAC over the years, including serving as Chairman of the CEAC Memorial Fund and Scholarship Committee since 2008, and Vice Chair of the transportation committee.

CEAC, formed in 1914 and headquartered in Sacramento, is comprised of county engineers, public works directors, county road commissioners, and professional personnel throughout California's 58 counties.
